CITY OF RAHWAY UPDATES



2011 STREET RESURFACING

Q: Will the city repave my street?

A: Street resurfacings and reconstructions are performed on an annual basis by private contractors and not the DPW. The City Engineer recommends streets that are in the most need of resurfacing and reconstruction.

The streets that are scheduled to be resurfaced this fall are:

- Jefferson Avenue (Hamilton Street to Stone Street)
- Trussler Place (Madison Avenue to Jefferson Street)
- East Emerson (Pierce Street to Fulton Street)
- Seminary Avenue (Church Street to Fernote Street)
- West Lake Avenue (Madison Avenue to Jefferson Street)
- Linden Avenue (St. Georges Avenue to Hulick Place)
- Jefferson Avenue (Stone Street to Nicholas Place, Elm Avenue to Jefferson Avenue Bridge, and Bramhall Road to West Inman Avenue)

- Madison Avenue (Intersections of Terrace Street, Murray Street, Concord Street and Orchard Street to West Inman Avenue)
- West Lake Avenue (125' west of Pierpont Street)
- Elm Avenue (250' East of St. Georges Avenue)
- Campbell Street (West Cherry Street to Elm Avenue)
- Richard Blvd. (At High School driveway)
- Main Street (East Milton Avenue to City Hall Drive)
- Maple Avenue (Southerly side, Madison Avenue to Old Lake Avenue)
- Broadway (Valley Road to Clark Twp.)
- Greslin Terrace (at intersec-

- tion of Revoir Drive)
- City Hall Plaza (behind City Hall)

Weather permitting, this project historically has been completed by mid-November.

Parking will be restricted on the above streets during resurfacing, and motorists are asked to use extra caution when traveling through the area. All of the streets will be milled and will be topped with two inches of new asphalt. Curb, sidewalk and catch basin repairs or replacements will be made where necessary.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IS A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY!

Pedestrians

- Always cross at corners, within marked crosswalks where available.
- Look left, right and left again before crossing. Watch for turning cars.
- Obey traffic signals, especially "Walk/Don't Walk".
- Remain alert! Don't assume that cars are going to stop.
- Wear reflective clothing when walking at night.
- Stay sober. Walking while impaired greatly increases your chances of being struck.

Motorists:

- Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks. Failure to yield carries a fine up to \$100.00 and 2 point license penalty (39:4-36).

- Watch for pedestrians when turning right on red.
- Obey speed limits.
- Do not block or park in crosswalks.
- Be alert for pedestrian at all times.

Children:

- Cross at intersections only.
- Never cross from in-between parked cars.
- Before crossing, look left, right and left again and listen for traffic.
- Wear light colored or reflective clothing at night.
- Obey all traffic signs and signals.
- Avoid playing in driveways or on sidewalks near roadways.

Seniors:

- Walk on sidewalks and cross only at corners, within marked crosswalks.
- Wear bright-colored or reflective clothing, especially at night.
- Look left, right and left again before crossing and be on the lookout for turning vehicles.
- Make eye contact with the driver before crossing in front of a vehicle.
- Learn the proper use of "Walk/Don't Walk" signals.
- Use the buddy system. Walk and cross with others when possible.
- If possible do not walk at night during bad weather such as snow, rain or ice.

Rahway Police Auxiliary: WANT TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

Have you been thinking about doing something for your community?

Are you interested in learning about law enforcement? Become an auxiliary police officer!

What is the auxiliary police?

Auxiliary police officers are 100% volunteer men and women who want to serve their community.

Auxiliary police officers have full police powers when working, are considered peace officers and have the opportunity to do many different things. They can direct traffic, perform crowd control, respond to emergencies, such as flooding, perform regular patrol functions, ride along with regular police officers on patrol and many other things, once they complete the Auxiliary Police Academy.

Training is done at Stamler Police Academy in Scotch Plains. The training runs for approximately three months and covers everything from traffic control to self-defense, CPR, basic first aid, use of force and physical conditioning. It is also a great introduction for those thinking of law enforcement as a career.

So What Do I Need To Do?

An applicant needs to be a United States Citizen, at least 18 years old, have a clean driving license and no prior arrest history.

Also, you should reside in town, unless the town you live in does not have a police auxiliary program.

An Auxiliary Police Officer is expected to work a minimum of eight hours per month. There are many opportunities to work more hours with various details.

Training will continue once you complete the academy. It varies, but has included things such as ICS (incident command system), HazMat (hazardous materials) familiarization and training as part of Rahway's CERT (Community Emergency Response Team).

There is a rank structure as in the regular police department from corporal to chief. Promotions may be earned by those who work hard, participate, gain experience over time and exhibit leadership.

There is fellowship, friendship, a chance to learn new skills, become a force multiplier for our police department and a way to give back to your community. If this sounds interesting to you – give us a call!

Remember this thought – volunteers are unpaid, not because they are worthless, but because they are priceless.

rigging system, which is a series of lines (ropes), blocks (pulleys), counterweights and raised frames surrounding the stage. This complex assembly enables a stage crew to quickly, quietly and safely fly (hoist) curtains, lights, scenery, stage effects and sometimes even people, like Peter Pan. Fly Systems are designed to move these theatrical components in and out of the audiences' view to create the wonderful world we all know as performance theatre.

A MESSAGE FROM
THE MAYOR'S DESK

Being split by the Rahway River, our city has long been at the mercy of Mother Nature after heavy rains. For as far back as I can remember, Rahway residents have told stories about a tropical storm or nor'easter that devastated parts of our city. We have tried, through building levees, pump stations and flood walls, to hold back the Rahway River, with varying degrees of success.

Hurricane Irene was a large and powerful Atlantic hurricane that left extensive flood and wind damage along its path through the Caribbean, the United States East Coast and as far north as Atlantic Canada. Rahway was not spared her wrath.

As the storm approached New Jersey, our Office of Emergency Management worked with County, State and Federal officials to begin preparations for the storm and its aftermath.

Irene dumped approximately 10 inches of rain on much of New Jersey that resulted in catastrophic flooding of the Rahway River and loss of electric power for much of the City. During the storm and in the days that followed, City of Rahway employees performed heroically to keep residents and visitors out of harm's way.

Police and fire personnel evacuated residents from flooded homes by land and by boat. Our crews even used a jet ski to rescue a resident who found himself trapped in rising flood waters. Public Works personnel used heavy equipment to reach stranded residents and manned pump stations throughout the night to protect lives and property. After the storm they directed PSE&G to downed power

lines and helped remove fallen trees and branches. Other accomplishments included (but were not limited to): securing road closures, pumping out flooded basements, restoring power, removing debris, providing emergency shelter and directing citizens towards public and private assistance.

Following the storm, our inspectors examined buildings for structural damage and for health hazards caused by the water. The Department of Public Works put in extra effort to remove over 12,000 tons of trash and debris from in front of residences and business.

Now that it is over 2 months since we crossed paths with Irene, there are still resources available to Rahway residents and businesses struggling with the aftermath of the hurricane. I invite you to visit our Web Site (www.cityofrahway.com) or our Facebook page (“City of Rahway”) for post-flood safety tips.

If you are a resident, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provides various levels of help, from temporary housing and repair or replacement of your home that was not covered by insurance. Funds may also be available for other necessary expenses and serious needs caused by the disaster.

FEMA has a satellite office at the Cranford Community Center (220 Walnut Ave.) where you may meet with FEMA representatives and see what federal assistance is available to you. You may also register with FEMA via telephone (800-621-3362) or online at www.disasterassistance.gov.

If you haven't already contacted FEMA, I suggest you do so immediately, as the deadline for registration is October 31.

In the weeks that followed Hurricane Irene, I have toured many areas of the City and met with dozens of residents. Of course, many of the stories you have told me were difficult and emotional. It is not easy to lose cherished possessions or the place that you call home.

Preventing the Rahway River from flooding is certainly a daunting and expensive task that may be impossible in the long run. What we can accomplish as a community is to take steps to lessen the impact of flooding and work together as neighbors to assist those in need during and after a disaster. I have the confidence in our own professionals, as well as many of you, that we will emerge from this storm more resilient and more willing to assist our fellow Rahway residents when trouble strikes.

MEDIA CHANGES, NEED FOR LIBRARY SUPPORT REMAINS

The library is no longer necessarily for just books. These days, patrons come to the library to also access the Internet or rent DVDs. That is certainly true at the Rahway Public Library, where these two uses have gained relative to book circulation in recent years.

Although this development may be concerning to some, especially those with a deep and long-term interest in the printed word, the fact that the library remains an important source of knowledge, information, and entertainment is reassuring to me. No matter the media, the library is still a first stop, a best hope, and the place to uncover an unexpected surprise, whether the goal is educational, professional, or related to those increasingly rare moments of relaxation and free time.

What is very concerning to

me, however, is that the library might be taken for granted. If you stop to think about it, the ability to easily access information and entertainment for no or low cost is astounding. In a time when a price tag is put upon anything (remember airline flights without luggage fees?), libraries are a terrific bargain.

But libraries are being squeezed by the same economic pressures that led airlines to start charging for what they formerly included in the price of a ticket. As with airlines, consolidation of services among independent libraries is one way of grappling with rising costs. We are likely to see more such efforts if the economy continues to contract.

The Friends of the Rahway Public Library is not bothered by changing tastes in media, but we are very much

concerned with helping to build a community of active and appreciative users of the library. Even more, we'd like to enlist this community to help us help the library navigate challenging times.

The Friends of the Rahway Public Library is a volunteer organization that supports the library through fundraising and volunteer activities. We meet monthly; membership rates are: individual, \$15; families, \$20; students (under 18) and seniors (over 55), \$5. Information and application forms can be picked up at the library's reference desk, and more information can be found on the group's Facebook page.

CITY OF RAHWAY: FLOOD PROTECTION INFORMATION

THE CITY OF RAHWAY is a participant in a federally subsidized program that enables property owners to purchase flood insurance with a 15% discount on their flood insurance premiums. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), requires that the City adopt specific flood damage reduction education, planning and building criteria.

In an effort to inform residents and property owners of the presence of flood hazards in Rahway and to suggest possible actions that may be taken to protect persons and property, the following article is being sent to you because the City of Rahway has many flood prone areas and your property may be susceptible to flooding.

Flood Insurance

Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover losses due to floods. However, since Rahway is a participant in the NFIP, it is possible for property owners to obtain federally backed flood insurance. This insurance is available to any owner of insurable property (a building or its contents) in Rahway. Tenants may also insure their personal property against flood loss. Also, most flood insurance policy holders in Rahway benefit from premium discounts. This is due to the City's extensive efforts to obtain credits, through the Community Rating system (CRS), to maintain specific measures for flood damage reduction.

The City strongly urges you to buy flood insurance as needed to protect yourself from devastating losses due to flooding. Following the purchase of flood insurance, NFIP imposes a 30-day waiting period, so residents should purchase insurance before the onset of the rainy season to ensure coverage during the flooding season. You can find out if your property is located in a special flood hazard area through the Office of the City Engineer at (732) 827-2176.

The local flood hazard

The areas in and around the North and South Branches of the Rahway River, the Robinson's Branch of the Rahway River, the Orchard St. Brook, Maurice Avenue Brook, Milton Lake, Rahway

River Park and certain other watercourses are subject to flooding. Flooding occurs in Rahway because the flood carrying capacities of the river channels are exceeded, which is caused by a number of factors, such as record rainfall intensities and increased impervious surfaces due to upstream development. Floodplain maps, charts, reports and studies that document these areas are available for review in the Department of Engineering and also available for review at the Rahway Public Library.

Flood protection assistance

The City Engineer's office can provide technical assistance relating to flood elevations and data on historical flooding, and is available to advise owners of appropriate flood protection measures. The City also has copies of elevation certificates for some properties in the floodplain. City staff members are available to undertake site visits, if requested and authorized, to review flood, drainage, and sewer issues. Please contact the Engineering Department at (732) 827-2176 for this service.

Flood safety

Following is a list of important considerations that should be followed during times of flooding:

1. Keep children away from flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains.
2. Evacuate the flood hazard area in times of impending flood or when advised to do so by the police or fire department.
3. In your home, turn off flood prone electrical circuits and shut off the water and gas service valves.
4. Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six-inches of moving water can sweep you off your feet.
5. Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. If your car stalls in high water, abandon it immediately and seek higher ground.
6. During times of heavy rainfall monitor the level of water in the drainage way.
7. Plan escape routes to high ground.
8. Know the following flood warning system.

Flood warning system

When the City of Rahway is expecting or experiencing inclement weather that may include heavy rain, residents in flood prone areas or low lying area are urged to plan preventative actions to protect life and property.

Residents are urged to monitor frequently weather and flood conditions that are broadcast over local radio and television stations. Residents will be provided with flood watch and flood warning advisories. A flood watch advisory indicates that the potential for a flood exists in the watch area, while a flood warning indicates that a flood has been detected.

Comcast Channel 34 covers the City and will issue timely updated information. This station is part of the Emergency Broadcast System (EBS) as are local television stations Channel 5 & 9. Radio station NJ 101.5 FM will also carry EBS messages.

In extreme situations, personnel of the Rahway Office of Emergency Management or Department of Public Safety will conduct "Route Altering" within flood prone areas to advise residents to move to higher ground prior to water levels reaching critical stages.

Property protection measures

There are various actions which can be taken to flood-proof structures. Depending upon the situation, location and availability of funds, the following measures can be used:

- a) Install a sump pump system to dispose of infiltrating water to grade outside of the structure;
- b) Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors of your home;
- c) Elevate electrical and mechanical equipment in the basement;
- d) Flood proof walls, windows and doors;
- e) Construct flood walls or closures;
- f) The most effective way to flood-proof a structure is to elevate it.
- g) During times of flooding, homes that have not been retrofitted can be protected during emergencies by the installation of sandbags.

Floodplain development regulations

Please be advised that all development, including filling

of land located in a special flood hazard area, is regulated differently from other areas and may require a permit. Contact the Office of the City Engineer at (732) 827-2176 for further information and prior to undertaking any activity within the floodplain or if you see non-permitted building or filling in the floodplain.

Recognize the natural and beneficial functions of floodplains to help reduce flooding

Floodplains are a natural component of the City of Rahway environment. Understanding and protecting the natural functions of floodplains help reduce flood damage and protect resources. When flooding spreads out across the floodplain, its energy is dissipated, which results in lower flood flows downstream, reduced erosion of the stream bank and channel, deposition of sediments higher in the watershed, and improved groundwater recharge. Floodplains are scenic, valued wildlife habitats, and suitable for residential gardening. Poorly planned development in floodplains can lead to stream bank erosion, loss of valuable property, increased risk of flooding to downstream properties, and degradation of water quality. A number of County and Municipal parks like the Rahway River Parkway and Milton Lake Park preserve the stream corridor and prevent development in perpetuity.

Drainage system maintenance

In addition to regulating development and fill within the flood hazard area, the City of Rahway and State of New Jersey have regulations prohibiting dumping in channels, obstructing flows or any activity that would adversely effect the water-carrying capacity of any channel, floodway or floodplain. It has been demonstrated that regulating development and maintaining drainage systems can alleviate recurrent flooding which endangers life and damages property and facilities. Any activities that may be in violation of these regulations should be reported to the Department of Engineering at (732) 827-2176.

Substantial improvement requirements

With respect to requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) relative to substantial improvement in the flood plain, please be advised that if the cost of reconstruction, rehabilitation, additions, or other improvement to a building or home equals or exceeds 50 percent of the building's market value, then the building must meet the same flood plain construction requirements as a new building. Substantially damaged buildings must also be brought up to the same standards.

This requirement means elevating the lowest floor, including basement and certain utility systems, one (1) foot above the base flood elevation, which is the 100-year flood elevation.

Map of the local flood hazard area:

To determine whether your property is located within a special flood hazard area, FEMA's Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) are available at the Office of the City Engineer at One City Hall Plaza, Rahway, New Jersey 07065. Rainbow In Rahway

New Jersey-based artist reclaims form



Graffiti. Tagging. Aerosol Art. Painting. Street murals.

What's in a name? NJ-based artist Leon Rainbow gets right to the point on his medium that is sometimes too quickly linked to its rebellious roots.

"It's Art," explains Rainbow, who has received national and international acclaim for his unique style with spray paint. "Graffiti can be productive or destructive—it all depends on what people want to do with it."

Brick Mob, a future retailer in the Rahway Arts District, wants to feature this increasingly popular style when its Irving Street storefront opens later this year. Brick Mob is a management and production company that promotes up and coming musicians; the storefront will feature an assortment of personal and home products, from clothing and coffee to incense and candles.

Rainbow partnered with fellow aerosol artist Demer at the end of August to bring the Brick Mob store to life. "The owners gave us ideas and themes with their logo and products, and then we get

to freestyle," Rainbow said. "There are traditions and techniques to this style and I blend that with my own creative freedom to fit the environment."

According to Rainbow that "place" refers to both the store and the town: "I really like the energy in Rahway. People are curious and were stopping by the store to watch us work. It's important to have that mindset, to be open to different mediums and styles."

The intrigue that Rahway residents expressed towards this artist and his one-of-a-kind work is common, which has given Rainbow an opportunity to reach even higher with his impact. "I present Aerosol Art in a positive, progressive manner. It's a beautiful art form and there's cultural significance, which leads to a learning opportunity in both life and Art. I teach youth and adult graffiti classes, conduct workshops, hold festivals and really try to bring all of the Arts together. That variety is what keeps it interesting for everyone."


