

FEBRUARY 2020 · BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In February 2020, the City of Rahway will join the entire nation in the annual celebration of Black History Month, which has been formally celebrated in the United States since 1976. Black History Month emphasizes and recognizes Black history and its many contributions to the history, society, and culture of our nation.

This year's celebration of Black History Month takes on additional significance as it marks the 150th anniversary of the Fifteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which was ratified on February 3, 1870. The Fifteenth Amendment prohibits the federal government and each state from denying any citizen the right to vote "on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude."

In Rahway, numerous events will mark the celebration of Black History Month.





Brine Program Information

Mayor Giacobbe and the Rahway Department of Public Works are proud to announce that the shared service arrangement with the Township of Kenilworth, Township of Clark and the Borough of Roselle will proceed. These communities have jointly purchased an automated salt brine production system and continue to work together on the distribution process. This system will continue to be utilized by the respective municipal public works crews enabling them to pre-treat their community's roads this winter more efficiently.

Using this quick and efficient method of pre-treating the streets has obvious advantages for motorists and for public works snow and ice control crews. The Department of Public Works in each community will have a more effective means to stay ahead of inclement weather. Salt brine will be sprayed on the streets a day or two before a storm is predicted. The application of salt brine prior to a snow storm will help prevent the bonding of snow and ice to the pavement making streets and roads much safer for everyone.

"Continuing our cost effective efforts to keep our roads clear and safe while reducing the amount of salt utilized benefits everyone both environmentally and economically." said Mayor Giacobbe.

Salvatore M. Mione Park Dedication

On Saturday, November 16, Mayor Raymond Giacobbe and members of the Rahway City Council joined nearly 200 people to celebrate the dedication of Rahway's newest park, named in honor of Salvatore M. Mione. The crowd gathered included members of Mr. Mione's family, members of veterans' organizations from across the state, and many members of the Rahway community. The new park is located on New Church Street, where Mr. Mione's former home stood. The property is now maintained as open space under New Jersey's Blue Acres program. The City has enhanced the property with the addition of a large, locally sourced boulder adorned with a commemorative plaque, a gravel path, trees, plantings and a flagpole.

Speeches made during the dedication ceremony paid tribute to Mr. Mione and his many contributions to the City and his steadfast advocacy on behalf of veterans. Mr. Mione served as a member of City Council for over 24 years. He also served as a member of the City's Planning Board and as Chair of the City's 9/11 Commission. Mr. Mione entered the United States Army in 1966 and was assigned to the 1st Air Cavalry Division in Vietnam. He served 12 months in combat, earning the Combat Infantryman Badge and Air Medal. Mr. Mione was a member of and served in leadership

roles with veterans' organizations throughout the \bar{S} tate of New Jersey, including the New York/New Jersey 1st Cavalry Division Association, Vietnam Veterans of America, Rahway Veterans Central Committee, American Legion, and Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was a founding member of the New Jersey Vietnam Veterans Memorial Committee and the Bayonne, NJ Vietnam Veterans Monument Committee, and served as Service Officer for the Union County Office of Veterans Affairs. Beyond these official roles, Mr. Mione selflessly dedicated his time to counseling and assisting veterans dealing with mental, emotional, and physical challenges following their service.

In his remarks during the ceremony, Mayor Giacobbe praised Mr. Mione for his contributions, and recognized City Council for authorization of the park and members of the Department of Public Works for their efforts to bring it to fruition.

Pothole Repair Program



The Public Works Department is called upon to repair hundreds of potholes throughout the City every year.

Anyone who observes a pothole should call the Rahway Department of Public Works Pothole Hotline at (732) 827-2061, please leave a brief description of the location when calling. Thank you for your cooperation.

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Driveway Clearing Tips

The following suggestions are intended to make your driveway snow removal easier and safer:

- If possible, wait until the street is completely plowed curb to curb before shoveling the last 5 to 10 feet of your driveway. This way less snow from the street will end up in your driveway. It takes several hours for DPW personnel to completely clear the snow from the street.
- It is best to place snow on the far side of your driveway, away from the direction the plow is traveling. This way the plow will move snow away from your driveway, rather than back into it.
- DO NOT shovel, blow or plow snow from your driveway into or across the street. Remember, you can be held account-

able for your actions as well as your contractor.
DO NOT allow children to play in the snow along the side of the street.
DPW personnel may need to push back snow days after the storm to

days after the storm to create room for the next snow event. Keep your children safe.

Winter Driving Tips

• Clean your vehicle of all snow and ice, including the roof, required by law in the state of New Jersey.

- Allow extra time to reach your destination.
- During snow storms, travel only when absolutely necessary.
- Keep a safe distance from plow trucks and snow response equipment.
- Don't pass a snow plow vehicle.
- Don't assume the snow plow operator can see

you. Every truck has blind spots which reduce side and rear visibility.

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
- Allow plenty of stopping distance, don't follow too closely.
- Keep your headlights on.Slow down.

- All-season tires on your car.
- Shovel & a sack of sand for generating traction under wheels.
- Flashlight with extra batteries.
- First aid kit and pocket knife.
- Necessary medications.
- Several blankets.
- Sleeping bags.

- Basic tools, screwdriver, adjustable wrench, etc.
- Booster / jumper cables.

Newly Created William Gawor Perpetual Scholarship Awarded To Rahway High School Senior

Lovingly characterized by her mom, Ms. Anabel Carter, as "the quiet kid always remaining in the back" who "prefers to be out of the spotlight," Rahway High School senior Alexis Carter must now come front and center to be recognized for her diligence, dedication, and impressive scholastic achievement. Ms. Carter was duly honored at this year's RHS graduation ceremonies as the first recipient of the newly established William Gawor Perpetual Scholarship, created in the memory of William "Citizen Bill" Gawor whose sincere wish was to assist in defraying the college tuition expenses of students pursuing a career in one of the four STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) fields of academic study. The scholarship provides for an initial \$5,000 grant, renewable for 3 years providing the student maintain a 3.0 grade point average and remain in a STEM field. A lifelong career as an electrical systems technician, combined with his true love and respect for education, had guided "Citizen Bill" in his wish to make this remarkable \$20,000 gift to a deserving RHS senior student.

Credited with ensuring that his uncle's vision become an actuality, Mr. Gawor's nephew Major General Stanley Genega, ret. celebrated the formal dedication of the scholarship to the high school in June of this year. Mr. Genega offers, "I am very pleased that we could make Uncle Willy's wishes a reality; I know he would be very pleased." 
Rahway Boys Soccer Cap Historic Season with First State Sectional Title

The Rahway High School boys soccer team are NJSIAA Central Group II State Sectional champions. After battling injuries to five starters and overcoming an early exit in the second round of the Union County tournament, the Indians capped a 16-win season with its first state sectional title in school history. Anchored by a sound defense and inspired goalkeeping, Rahway held their opponents scoreless in 14 games as they also laid claim to the Union County Conference's Valley Division title.


Thrilling home victories over Metuchen, South Plainfield, and Governor Livingston in the state sectional tournament saw fourth-seeded Rahway secure a spot in the finals against second-seeded and presumptive favorites Delaware Valley. There, the team left the comforts of Rahway River Park and ventured to Frenchtown, New Jersey where nearly a hundred fans, family members, and supportive school staff ventured to the Pennsylvania border to witness the historic 1-0 victory.

While Martin St. Fleur, an industrious midfielder who scored in all four state sectional tournament games, was named NJ.com's Central Group II standout player, longtime coach Kevin O'Callahan would proudly point to the contributions of his entire roster, including a number of underclassmen and junior varsity players who were called upon to contribute late in the season as the team chased the elusive state title.

Though the team's Group II state playoff run came to an end with a 2-0 defeat to offensive juggernauts and perennial state title winners Delran, Athletic Director Mr. Thomas Lewis lauded the team's "exciting and rewarding experience" highlighted by the team's humility and graciousness in victory despite its underdog status.


New Jersey Golden Gloves Finds a Home at Rahway's UCPAC!



Rahway's Own: Recognizing The Hero In All

"It's doing the little things that makes you a success,' offers retired RHS Social Studies teacher John Odin. "Be a part of something bigger, leave the world a better place, and you will earn the title of hero." Mr. Odin's opening remarks to students at the formal ceremony hosted by the high school to recognize this year's inductees honored as 'Rahway's Own' gave insight into the undeniable spirit of the celebration. "The effects of their achievements done in service to others and to inspire others," affirms Mistress of Ceremonies Ms. Dawn Rogers, "makes this year's inductees true 'exemplars' of what it means to be a hero."

Originally signed as a rookie free agent by the Chicago Bears in May 2015 and later as free agent by the NY Giants in March 2019, defensive tackle and Rahway High School graduate Olsen Pierre, who could not be present due to prior professional commitments, exemplifies Ms. Rogers' portrait of a hero in light of his drive to pursue the dream that was his

first love, his drive not to fear failure, and his opportunity to serve as an inspiration to others.

Although recognized today as a hero in his own right, inductee Gary Gonzalez, Executive Chef at Rahway's own Irving Inn and 'Chopped' champion, humbly describes himself as "just a simple guy who had a dream." In his sincere words shared with the students, Mr. Gonzalez offered this inspirational advice, "Go for what you want, never give up, and do what's best for you and your family."

Recently appointed by the United Soccer Coaches as the new chair of the Youth Coaches Advocacy Group, Soccer Coach Marguerite Ferrell is most definitely living her advice to the RHS students to "make the world a better place because you're in it." In her role as chair, Ms. Ferrell will build a team of coaches from all levels of the youth game to identify the needs of the membership and to advocate on their behalf. She is currently the Club Development manager for U.S. Soccer, overseeing a

13-state region in the Northeast to improve everyday soccer environments for players and to support player development. She caringly reminds the students that, "You are ALL future heroes," and tasks them to "discover your purpose."

Senior Political Strategist Joel Payne has brought more than 14 years of experience in the public and private sector focusing on crisis communication, public affairs, issues management, media strategy, and multicultural outreach. In 2016 he served as director of African-American paid media and advertising for the 'Hillary for America' general election presidential campaign. A frequent guest on FOX news, FOX Business, MSNBC, CBS News, and TV One Newsmax, Mr. Payne is proud to admit that he "stands on the shoulders of heroes," citing his strength as coming from his father and mother, to whom he refers as simply "everyday people." He continues that it was they who "were committed to education, faith, and family and did everything for us...and THAT's a hero.'



Having earned the affectionate monikers of 'Papa Bear' and the 'Cryptologic Warrior' throughout his distinguished career in the United States Marine Corps, General Alfred (Al) M. Gray, Jr. served as the 29th Commandant of the Corps and is a recognized member of the NSA Hall of Fame. The outstanding reputation held by Marine Corps tactical signals intelligence (SIGINT) units today can be directly traced to the pioneering efforts and accomplishments of General Gray

over four decades of dedicated service. In 1962, he commanded the first Marine Corps ground SIGNIT unit to deploy to South Vietnam and implemented and refined doctrine and practice for direct support to combat units in the war in Southeast Asia. His modest advice to students? "Dream big, don't fear failure, and bring others along with you." To help the students in their task to make the world a better place, the sage General shared this secret, "Everything you get done - you get done with people."



CITY OF RAHWAY: FLOOD PROTECTION INFORMATION

The City of Rahway is a participant in a federally subsidized program that enables most property owners to purchase flood insurance with up to a 20% discount on their flood insurance premiums. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), requires that the City adopt specific flood damage reduction education, planning and building criteria.

In an effort to inform residents and property owners of the presence of flood hazards in Rahway and to suggest possible actions that may be taken to protect persons and property, the following article is being sent to you because the City of Rahway has many flood prone areas and your property may be susceptible to flooding

Flood Insurance

Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover losses due to floods. However, since Rahway is a participant in the NFIP, it is possible for property owners to obtain federally backed flood insurance. This insurance is available to any owner of insurable property (a building and/or its contents) in Rahway. Tenants may also insure their personal property against flood loss

Branch of the Rahway River, the Orchard St. Brook, Maurice Avenue Brook, Allen Street Brook, Milton Lake, Rahway River Park and certain other watercourses are subject to flooding. Flooding occurs in Rahway because the flood carrying capacities of the river channels are exceeded, which is caused by a number of factors, such as record rainfall intensities and increased impervious surfaces due to upstream development. Floodplain maps, charts, reports and studies that document these areas are available for review in the Department of Engineering and also available for review at the Rahway Public Library.

Flood protection assistance

The City Engineer's office can provide technical assistance relating to flood elevations and data on historical flooding, and is available to advise owners of appropriate flood protection measures. The City also has copies of elevation certificates for some properties in the floodplain. City staff members are available to undertake site visits, if requested and authorized, to review flood, drainage, and sewer issues. Please contact the Engineering Department at (732) 827-2176 for this service.

preventative actions to protect life and property.

Residents are urged to monitor frequently weather and flood conditions that are broadcast over local radio and television stations. Residents will be provided with flood watch and flood warning advisories. A flood watch advisory indicates that the potential for a flood exists in the watch area, while a flood warning indicates that a flood has been detected

Comcast Channel 34 covers the City and will issue timely updated information. This station is part of the Emergency Broadcast System (EBS) as are local television stations Channel 5 & 9. Radio station NJ 101.5 FM, NIXLE and UCFIRSTALERT will also carry EBS messages. Please register for these updates at Nixle.com and Ucfirstalert.org.

In extreme situations, personnel of the Rahway Office of Emergency Management or Department of Public Safety will conduct "Route Altering" within flood prone areas to advise residents to move to higher ground prior to water levels reaching critical stages.

Property protection measures There are various actions which can be taken

Recognize the natural and beneficial functions of floodplains to help reduce flooding

Floodplains are a natural component of the City of Rahway environment. Understanding and protecting the natural functions of floodplains help reduce flood damage and protect resources. When flooding spreads out across the floodplain, its energy is dissipated which results in lower flood flows downstream, reduced erosion of the stream bank and channel, deposition of sediments higher in the watershed, and improved groundwater recharge. Floodplains are scenic, valued wildlife habitats, and suitable for residential gardening. Poorly planned development in floodplains can lead to stream bank erosion, loss of valuable property, increased risk of flooding to downstream properties, and degradation of water quality. A number of County and Municipal parks like the Rahway River Park and Milton Lake Park preserve the stream corridor and prevent development in perpetuity.

Drainage system maintenance

In addition to regulating development and fill within the flood hazard area, the City of Rahway and State of New Jersey have regulations prohibiting dumping in cha obstructing flows or any activity that would adversely effect the water-carrying capacity of any channel, floodway or floodplain. It has been demonstrated that regulating development and maintaining drainage systems can alleviate recurrent flooding which endangers life and damages property and facilities. Any activities that may be in violation of these regulations should be reported to the Department of Engineering at (732) 827-2176.

Also, most flood insurance policy holders in Rahway benefit from premium discounts. This is due to the City's extensive efforts to obtain credits, through the Community Rating System (CRS), to maintain specific measures for flood damage reduction.

The City strongly urges you to buy flood insurance as needed to protect yourself from devastating losses due to flooding. Following the purchase of flood insurance, NFIP imposes a 30-day waiting period, so residents should purchase insurance before the onset of the rainy season to ensure coverage during the flooding season.

You can find out if your property is located in a special flood hazard area through the Office of the City Engineer at (732) 827-2176. The City can also provide the following: basic information found on FEMA's Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) needed to write a flood insurance policy, information regarding floodways and other non-insurance rating information displayed on the FIRM, information regarding flood depths, and information on past flooding.

The local flood hazard

The areas in and around the North and South Branches of the Rahway River, the Robinson's

Flood safety

Following is a list of important considerations that should be followed during times of flooding:

1. Keep children away from flood waters. ditches, culverts and storm drains.

2. Evacuate the flood hazard area in times of impending flood or when advised to do so by the police or fire department

3. In your home, turn off flood prone electrical circuits and shut off the water and gas service valves.

4.Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six-inches of moving water can sweep you off your feet. 5.Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. If your car stalls in high water, abandon it immediately and seek higher ground.

6.During times of heavy rainfall monitor the level of water in the drainage way. 7. Plan escape routes to high ground. Know the following flood warning system.

Flood warning system

When the City of Rahway is expecting or experiencing inclement weather that may include heavy rain, residents in flood prone areas or low lying area are urged to plan

to flood-proof structures. Depending upon the situation, location and availability of funds, the following measures can be used: a) Install a sump pump system to dispose of infiltrating water to grade outside of the structure;

b) Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors of your home; c) Elevate electrical and mechanical

equipment in the basement;

d) Flood proof walls, windows and doors; e) Construct flood walls or closures

f) The most effective way to flood-proof a structure is to elevate it.

g) During times of flooding, homes that have not been retrofitted can be protected during emergencies by the installation of sandbags. h) Install flood vents in building walls, doors, or enclosures that are subject to frequent flooding and are not flood-proofed.

Floodplain development regulations

Please be advised that all development, including filling of land located in a special flood hazard area, is regulated differently from other areas and may require a permit. Contact the Office of the City Engineer at 732-827-2176 for further information and prior to undertaking any activity within the floodplain or if you see non-permitted building or filling in the floodplain.

Substantial improvement requirements

With respect to requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) relative to substantial improvement in the flood plain, please be advised that if the cost of reconstruction, rehabilitation, additions. or other improvement to a building or home equals or exceeds 50 percent of the building's market value, then the building must meet the same flood plain construction requirements as a new building. Substantially damaged buildings must also be brought up to the same standards.

This requirement means elevating the lowest floor, including basement and certain utility systems, one (1) foot above the base flood elevation, which is the 100-year flood elevation. A 100-year flood water surface
